was also used to tell stories. Whether it was the stories of conquests and dynasties (China) or gods and goddesses (Egypt) or both (Greece) ancient pottery was two things: Useful and BEAUTIFUL!

**Project** – Create a container inspired by your favourite ancient style.

You will create your own ceramic container using a pinch pot or coil process. You will first conduct research into your favourite ancient style, then create it for a function you could use it for (Cup, bowl, mug, thumb tack holder) and decorate it based on a story you like.

**Steps** – How are we going to do that?

- 11. Research one style of ancient pottery: Chinese, Egyptian or Greek. (Circle One.) Find one piece that you like on google images and, On the back of this page, answer these questions:
  - a. When was this piece created?
  - b. What function was it used for?
  - c. What story is it depicting?
  - d. What characters or symbols are shown that help identify the story?
- 12. Practice the pinch pot and coil techniques with scrap clay. Which process do you prefer?
- 13. Get a new piece of clay and begin to create your own container, be careful to *slip and score* any handles or decorative elements. *Dip carving tools in water* to carve smooth lines.
- 14. Once the piece is bisque fired, begin glazing the base colours.
- 15. Once it is glaze fired draw or paint your story.
