## UNIT 1 – INTRODUCTORY SKILLS (PT 2)

### OBJECTIVE

You've discovered that you can develop images of the face and some basic ideas in Photoshop – this unit will explore more ancient observational art making techniques as well as more programs of which you could make digital art.

### INSPIRATION

Most artists, from Da Vinci all the way up to the contemporary artists you've just researched, practice their skills by drawing from observation. Even the best illustrators with signature styles know how to look at something and re-create it realistically on paper. (Anime artists draw anime because they want to, not because they can't draw realistically!)

### PROJECTS

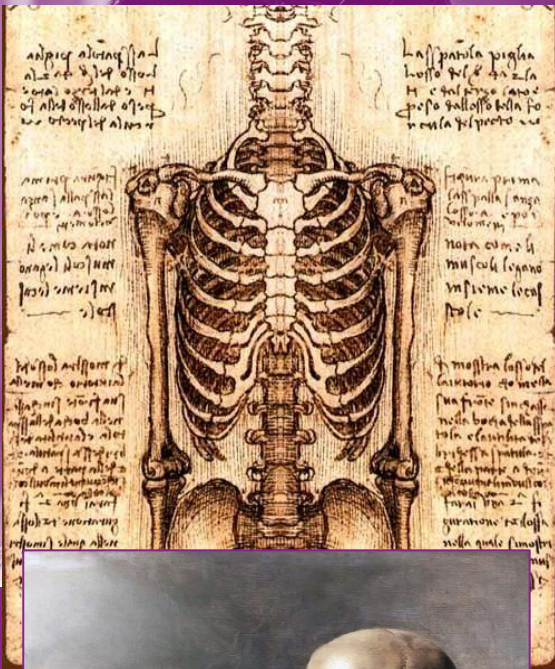
This unit will focus on one project in two different programs. We are going to create two still life drawings: one in Photoshop with a painterly style and one in Illustrator with a vector style.

### STEPS

- 1) Watch a video explaining "sight measuring."
- 2) Draw a still life in photoshop of an interesting object.
- 3) Draw the SAME still life in illustrator and compare!

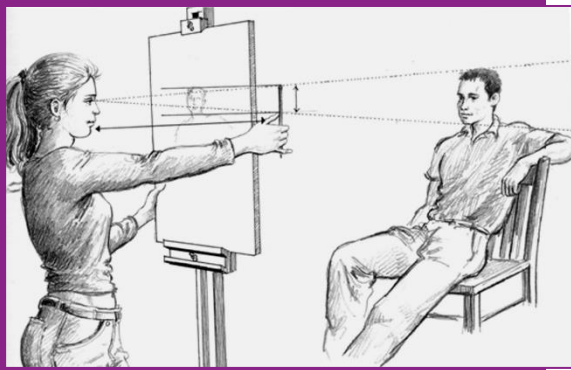


Adobe Photoshop –

+ vector images





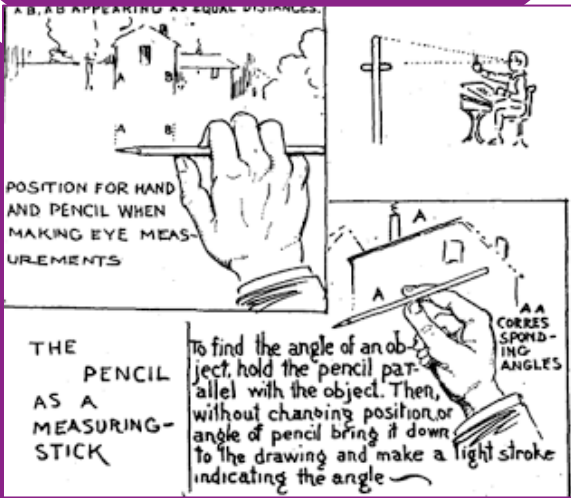

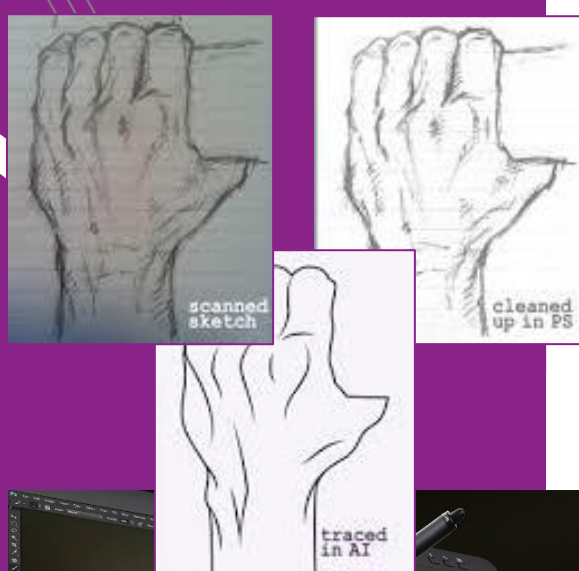

## Warm up #1: Sight Measuring and Observational Drawing

<https://addisonsartroom.weebly.com/grade-twelve.html> - Click the Sight Measure button. Look at something at least an arm's distance away. Close one eye, extend your arm with a pencil in your hand and compare the size of the end of your pencil to the object you're looking at. How many "pencil ends" high is this object? How many wide? Draw a rough grid shape or some guide lines on your paper to show these measurements.

This all comes down to details. Start with a fairly high resolution picture of a person. (yourself, or a celebrity or someone else with permission.) Open this file in illustrator and begin using the pen tool and different layers to trace the different features of the face. The more effort and time you put into tracing the shading, highlights and little details, the better the portrait will look!



#### Project: Still Life in your favourite program.

Using your realistic drawing techniques and the tools you've covered in the basics lessons for Photoshop and Illustrator, choose which program you're going to use to create a still life. Set up 3-5 objects on your table, draw them and colour them! You can choose to draw them on paper first, or to go straight to digital. They can look illustrative or painted, whichever works best for you!
